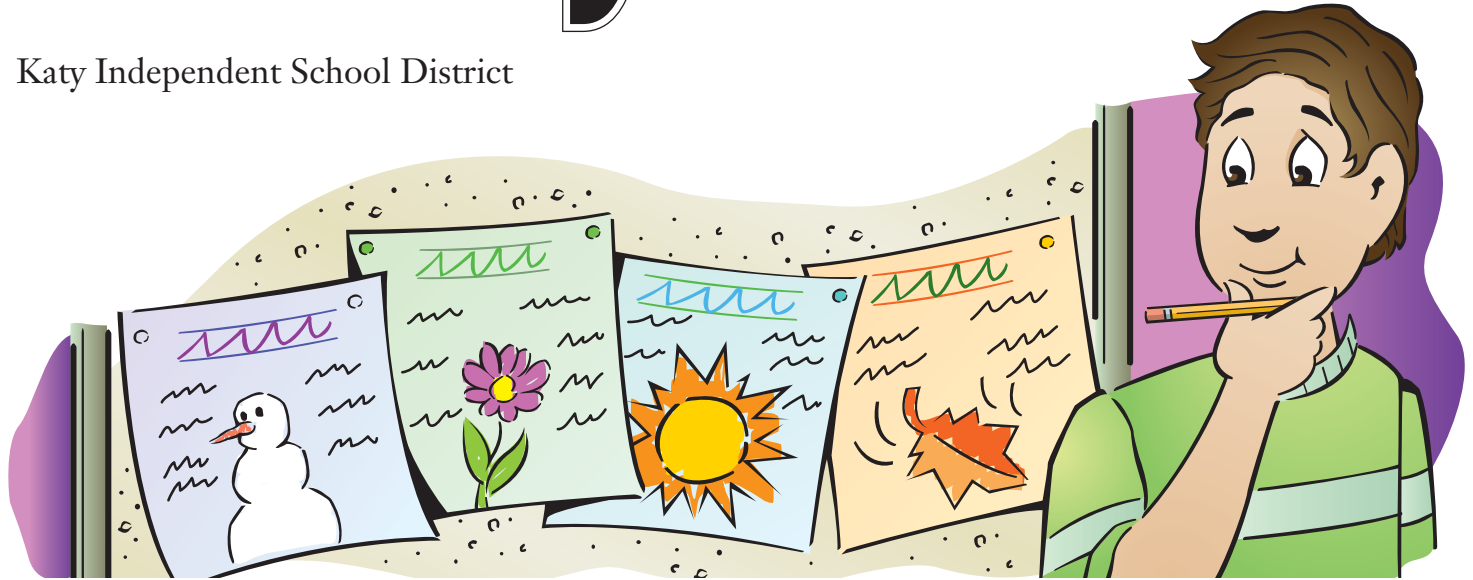

<b>1</b> Find a place to go swimming with your child. Afterwards, ask your child to write a poem about how it felt.	<b>2</b> Visit the library. Help your child check out a book about a summer sport.	<b>3</b> Put some objects on a tray. Have your child study it, then close his eyes. Remove one. Ask him what's missing?	<b>4</b> Look in the sports section of the newspaper. On a map, have your child mark where different teams are located.	<b>5</b> Read a weather report in the newspaper. Have your child list all the weather words.	<b>6</b> Teach your child to figure batting averages (number of hits divided by number of at-bats).	<b>7</b> Play "Charades" or another guessing game with your child today.
<b>8</b> Visit a zoo. Have your child look for the similarities in animal families. What do cats have in common? Primates?	<b>9</b> Visit the library. Help your child check out a book about a hero or heroine.	<b>10</b> Together, use the Internet to learn about another country. If you don't have a computer, try a library.	<b>11</b> How many peanut butter sandwiches can you make from one jar? Have your child keep track.	<b>12</b> At the grocery store, look for geometric shapes. Can your child find a cone? A cylinder? A cube? A sphere?	<b>13</b> Together, make a leaf painting. Paint a leaf with a thin layer of paint. Press onto a piece of paper.	<b>14</b> Look at the stars with your child. Together, make up your own constellation—the Barbell, the Big Umbrella.
<b>15</b> Encourage your child and friends to put on a talent show. You supply popcorn and applause.	<b>16</b> Visit the library. Help your child check out a "how-to" book.	<b>17</b> Look in the newspaper for interesting words. Help your child make them into a crossword puzzle.	<b>18</b> Review math with flash cards. Your child starts across the room. A right answer means a step forward.	<b>19</b> Tired of nagging your child to do chores? Use a "chore chart." Your child checks off chores as he finishes.	<b>20</b> Have your child list school supplies she'll need. Then check ads to see where the best prices are.	<b>21</b> Have your child choose a project from his "how-to" book and do it together.
<b>22</b> Look for an interesting picture in the newspaper. Have your child write a story about it.	<b>23</b> Visit the library. Help your child check out a book about animals or endangered species.	<b>24</b> Have your child count to 100. Time him. See if he can match his time counting backwards from 100.	<b>25</b> Have your child add up the costs of the school supplies she priced last week.	<b>26</b> Read half a fairy tale to your child. Ask him to make up a new ending.	<b>27</b> Help your child answer a silly question that requires math: "How many minutes until your birthday?"	<b>28</b> Set aside time to make a summer scrapbook with your child.
<b>29</b> Have everyone name one food that tastes like summer. Serve those foods today.	<b>30</b> When you're at the library, visit a new section.
