






SEMESTER GRADES



- Grades <u>ALWAYS</u> count.
- All daily grades, quizzes and test grades will be recorded in the gradebook.
- The three 6-weeks grades count for 85% of the semester average.
- The final exam grade counts as 15% of the semester average.
- The semester averages are recorded on the transcript.
- Attendance matters for credit, regardless of the grade on the transcript!
- GPA is calculated using semester averages.
- You must attend class, to earn credit, regardless of grade.
- Credits are earned at semester.









- Credit is earned through a passing grade (70 or higher).
- Students cannot repeat courses from the junior high if credit was already earned.
- A semester course with a passing grade will award half or .5 credit.
- Summer school will be recommended for class failures-AP Classes cannot be recovered through summer school (credit recovery).
- Attendance matters regardless of grade made in class!

COURSE SELECTION MUSTS



- Everyone must sign up for 7 courses.
- Everyone MUST choose 3 alternate classes in the system.
 - Every year there are: Classes that do not make, students select an elective that conflicts with another class/program they chose, or there are too many students who selected the class. If/when this happens, counselors will go to your alternate classes you entered in SchooLinks. If you do not have alternates in place, counselors will choose your alternate class for you.





CHANGING COURSES?



Please be extremely thoughtful when choosing classes. After course verification is complete, students will not be able to change their classes (with the exceptions including the reasons below). Schools build the master schedule (how many courses offered and when they are offered) based upon the classes students choose during course selection.

If we allow students to change their mind after the Spring course verification deadline, the school's schedule would be off balance.

Students can only change a course if.....

- Student failure a prerequisite course (i.e failed chemistry but placed in AP Chemistry).
- Change in Program (Band, Orchestra, Athletics, Choir-either adding or removing the program).
- Failing a KAP/AP course at a six weeks or semester grading period.
- Level changes as recommended by teachers and the student's counselor with parental knowledge and principal approval based on lack of prerequisite skills.
- Failure of an EOC (STAAR Test) and need an intervention course.
