Statement of Purpose

Hutsell's Parent & Family Engagement Policy

A Parent & Family Engagement Policy is developed annually with parents, administration, and staff for students at Hutsell Elementary. The policy is shared with our parents during Title 1 Parent Orientation meetings scheduled during the first nine weeks of school. It is sent home in the school take-home folders, made available in the front office, and posted on the school website. The policy is reviewed twice during the school year, and it is approved annually during the fourth nine weeks of school at the CAT (Campus Advisory Team) meeting.

Hutsell Elementary will:

a. Offer a flexible number of meetings within the school day or evening and provide adequate notification for parental attendance.

These meetings include awards ceremonies, parent-teacher conferences, LPAC meetings, school information nights, and PTA executive board meetings. All notifications are sent home in the student take-home folder. The meetings are also listed on the school calendar on the school website.

b. Involve parents in the planning, review, and improvement of the school.

Title 1 parents complete a survey at the end of the school year to provide feedback for the program. This aids the campus Title 1 Instructors and administrators in making decisions regarding the Parent Involvement Policy, our Title 1 program, and funds for the program's future.

Annual review and revision of the Parent & Family Engagement Policy is conducted by the Title 1 instructors twice during the school year. This policy is distributed in the student takehome folder in October, made available in the front office and on the school website. Parents interested in serving on the site-based decision-making committee (Campus Advisory Team) can contact the campus principal.

c. Attend an annual district Title 1 meeting to inform parents of their school's participation in the Title 1 Program.

- f. Receive timely responses to their suggestions.

Shared Responsibilities for Student Achievement

Shared responsibility builds on the belief that school-community links are critical to creating environments where all children can reach high academic standards. These links are encouraged by the School/Parent/Student Compact. The Compact is designed to increase the shared responsibility between families and schools for the high performance of students.

What is a school-parent compact?
