Q: How did you begin your journey as a mentor?

Greg: I got involved after attending Men Who Mentor in 2014, and have mentored four different young men since. As a Katy ISD employee, I knew about this opportunity, and when my youngest graduated from high school I decided to look into it and never looked back. I figured, I don't have my boys at home, so let me get out and pour into some lives of other young men in the school district.

Q: What does serving as a mentor involve?

Greg: The kids just need somebody to help encourage and support them, and to help get that confidence level up. It's been a real joy to be able to meet with these kids once a week. I taught one

elementary student how to play chess and most days, it was just playing and really nothing would be said. By the end of the year, we could never finish a game because we got to talking so much about different things. He was finally starting to open up.

We even stayed connected through a pen pal program during the pandemic, since we were not able to visit the campus for so many months.

Q: What has mentoring in Katy ISD meant to you?

Greg: You find out everyone has a different story, and kids struggle in different ways. We just never know what kind of an impact we can make by simply being there once a week. Seeing the excitement in their eyes every time I show up is my favorite part.

Also, being part of the KEYS program is like having an extended family with the campus employees who are so supportive of all the mentors. It really gives mentors a sense of community and togetherness when we arrive on campus.

Q: How would you encourage someone else to become a KEYS mentor?

Greg: I would say you just have no idea what impact you can make on that child's life throughout the years. The mentors I had growing up made me feel special. It helped to give me a purpose to keep going. We just never know what kind of impact - playing chess or cards, or simply being there for them once a week - can have on that kid's life.

The turning point in many of our lives came when someone we respected and admired declared, "I believe in you." A KEYS mentor can be that person for a Katy ISD student. They are guides, teachers, coaches, listeners, role models, advocates, cheerleaders and more.

When a student is identified by a teacher, counselor or parent as a candidate, the campus KEYS liaison goes to work searching for a mentor. A perfect match can result in a lifetime bond that empowers the student to rewrite their own narrative, renewing their confidence and sparking hope one hour, one week at a time.

Rebecca Miller, a single mother working to finish school and provide for her two children, turned to the KEYS program as an additional source of support. Her son was matched with his first mentor in the first grade. "I knew Collin needed a male role model. We have very few family members and they're all spread across the country. So, my kids did not have a lot of adult love outside our home," said Rebecca.

Collin's younger sister, Kamryn,

own when she was in second grade.
Both kids met weekly on campus
with their mentors, continuing with
KEYS through graduation. "We
were incredibly blessed with having
mentors that were in it for the long
haul. And literally at 20 and 21, my kids
are still in contact with their mentors,
and they have something for life. It's
been so good for another person to
love my kids" revealed Rebecca

She admits her children were struggling socially and academically, and had to overcome the fear of being judged and feeling inadequate as a parent. "It was very difficult for me to say I needed help, that my kids needed help, because I couldn't find it on my own," she recalled. "But I came to the conclusion that having another adult to love your kid can never hurt them." Along the way, Rebecca worked closely with KEYS liaisons who facilitated the process and kept the lines of communication open to ease any fears or concerns.

Collin and Kamryn's futures are bright and Rebecca knows without a doubt that their mentors made a difference. "I believe fully when they're older and are in a place where they can be a mentor themselves, they absolutely will because it was such a blessing for them."

Sister Schools representatives rely on each other all year long. Campuses work together identifying needs, sharing spirit nights, delivering teacher treats and arranging mascot visits. Collaboration between campuses makes the pairings stronger over time, ultimately better supporting students and staff.

Sister Schools has undoubtedly taken on a life of its own. New schools often ask to be paired up, principals who change schools take their commitment to the program with them and faculty even find new positions at their Sister Schools. This is all a testament to the strength of our community and the intrinsic value of Sister Schools connections.

SISTER SCHOOLS SNAPSHOTS

Stockdick Junior High & WoodCreek Junior High

As they complete their second year as principals of their respective junior high schools, Dr. Ann Lalime of Stockdick and Dr. Andrew Lowry of WoodCreek have "discovered a bond along the way through their campus' longtime Sister Schools relationship. Although we might be competitors on the field or in the fine arts domain, at the end of the day we're partners. And the more we come together, the better we are as one," according to Dr. Lowry.

Dr. Lalime adds, "there's a lot of camaraderie back and forth between our two schools. Our teachers communicate about teaching strategies and things they need help with. Even the National Junior Honor Society students are reaching out to their counterparts at WoodCreek, planning joint community service projects."

Dr. Lalime recalls one especially meaningful contribution that resulted from her previous Sister Schools connection. "I became a KEYS mentor for a student that was on my Sister School campus. It started in second grade and now he's a junior at Taylor High School, proving the Sister Schools program provides a spark that builds life connections."









Bonnie Holland Elementary & Zelma Hutsell Elementary

One of the longest lasting Sister Schools pairings is between Holland and Hutsell Elementary, both named after incredible Katy ISD leaders. The principals at these campuses, Dr. Margie Blount at Hutsell and Linnea Griffith at Holland, make planning events and sharing needs a priority. Dr. Blount notes, "there's probably more collaboration going on between our two campuses than we as principals could ever imagine."

Holland's Sister Schools liaison, Teresa Russell, recalls one of her favorite Sister Schools moments. "We put handwritten notes of encouragement with a treat in every Hutsell teacher's box on campus. They immediately reached out to let us know how much the messages and kind gesture meant to them."

Hutsell and Holland adopt families at Christmas, share school supply drives and spirit nights, and invite Sister School parents to speak during career days. "We look at resources beyond our campus to really unite the community," says Margie. "I'm so grateful for a program that brings us together."

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turn anyone away. Initially, the decision was to allow 40 girls, but we've accepted 63!"

One of the foundation's most fervent supporters and board president is Matt Schomburg of State Farm Insurance. Matt has been proudly wearing leis and blowing noisemakers to celebrate educators at campus grant announcements since the foundation's beginning. He says, "you get to meet some fantastic people through this journey. I want to live and work in a community where people support one another and the school district is successful, because that adds so much value to where we live. It's awesome to support our teachers because we know they're pouring the best into our kids and our community. So, it's a win-win."

Sewell Automotive has partnered with the foundation as a platinumlevel investor for the last five years. Lance Baker, Sewell

The foundation's teacher grants allow donors to interact directly with the teachers we support. Ten years, \$2.6 million and 596 teacher grants later, the foundation is an ever-present benefactor granting teachers' wishes all over the district. Acting as a stand-alone, non-profit organization, the foundation connects investors directly with teachers and students.

The magic begins with an idea as Katy ISD teachers present their proposals for dynamic, innovative classroom instruction. Grants are awarded in increments of \$1,000, \$2,500 or \$5,000, with every penny impacting Katy ISD classrooms for years to come.

Gabriela Bogani, a three-time grant recipient at Campbell Elementary, shared a few highlights from her team's grant. "As teachers, 'GEMS, Are You

Thinking Bling?' has given us the opportunity to go beyond the four walls of our classrooms. Students have met and zoomed with women engineers from BP and Women in Science and Engineering (WISE) at Texas A&M University. 
