Kindergarten Gifted and Talented Identification

- ★ Kindergarten Parent Checklists are currently being accepted for any parents interested in screening their child.
- ★ Challenge Forms Have Gone Digital and can be found on the Katy ISD Gifted/Talented Advanced Academics website. Parents wishing to refer their children for GT screening must fill out a checklists and submit it electronically by September 21,2023 at 4:00. No paper copies will be accepted.
- ★ Kindergarten students identified for GT service, participate in the elementary GT program, Challenge, for 60 minutes per week beginning the week of March 1. The Kindergarten GT curriculum introduces students to creative and productive thinking skills. Students identified for GT service in Kindergarten join the elementary pull-out program, Challenge, for one day per week in 1st grade.

- ★ Students identified for GT service will participate in the elementary GT pull-out program, which fosters creative, productive thinking along with independent research skills. Students identified for GT service in 1st-4th grades will join the elementary pull-out program, Challenge, for one day per week the following school year.
- ★ Screening is from November-April. Letters will be sent home at the end of May with test results.
