

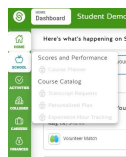

 - ❖ Take a 3rd, 4th, or 5th year of Languages Other than English (Spanish, French, German, Chinese, ASL)
 - ❖ Continue in math for every year of high school even after you earn 4 credits
 - ❖ Take a few challenging courses throughout high school (KAP, AP, Dual Credit)
 - ❖ Many of the more competitive schools want to see a full academic day with courses taken on campus.

 - A **fourth science** credit

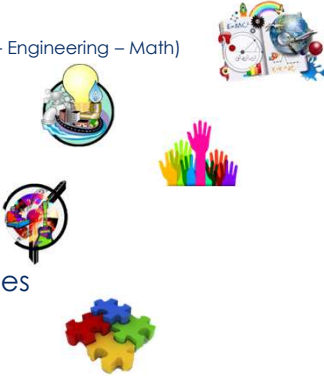
A student must graduate with a Distinguished Level of Achievement (DLA) to be considered for the Top 10% and eligibility for automatic admission to a Texas public college or university.

CAN I TRY KAP/AP IF I AM CURRENTLY IN ACADEMIC?

- Current or previous performance in related content area course: An A semester average in an academic course
- For Science placement only, current or previous performance in math course: An A semester average in an academic course OR a B or better semester average in a KAP course.
- Teacher recommendation—please discuss with your teacher.
- Signed Waiver Form for math and science courses

CAN I EXIT KAP OR AP IF I CHANGE MY MIND?

- **Students may choose to exit KAP or AP the first 10 days of school by submitting a schedule change request.**
- Students may petition to exit at the end of a grading period if their grade falls between a 70-75 and they meet the petition criteria.
- Students who earn a 0-69 will be removed from the class at the end of the grading period unless otherwise recommended by the teacher and administrator.

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DUAL CREDIT COURSES

- Dual credit courses are offered through Houston Community College and are taught on the SLHS campus. Students receive high school and college credit. Enrollment in HCC dual credit courses are subject to the student meeting all enrollment requirements. Dual credit courses are on a 4.5 GPA scale. (4.5 for an A, 3.5 for B, etc.)

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DUAL CREDIT THINGS TO CONSIDER

- Many CTE Dual Credit courses are not transferable. They are specific to the HCC program of study.
- Double check with colleges regarding their acceptance of dual credit coursework
- Some courses do not have an academic equivalent to level down to. You will have to remain in the course through the end of the semester
- Math and Science:
 - ❖ Needs to be a 5th course in that subject area
 - ❖ Strong B in previous coursework in the subject

- 4.5 weighted GPA scale
- Structured similar to actual college—earning an A or B earns college credits for **Texas** public universities
- Private **and out of state** universities may not accept credits

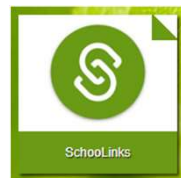

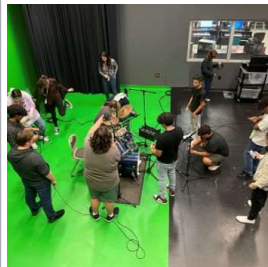

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TUITION BASED ONLINE COURSES (KVS)



- Starting this year, there will no longer be a KVS application.
- The process to request a KVS course has changed.
 - ❖ To register for a course, you will have to wait to meet with your Counselor during the preschedule meeting time.
 - ❖ Summer courses and school year courses will be requested at that time.
 - ❖ KVS courses are based on Counselor approval.
- Students may only take 2 courses per term, regardless of the level.
- Students may only take 10 credits total from KVS, Faithwest, or TXVSN.
- A list of available courses can be found on the Katy Virtual School website

Your counselor must approve your courses. Make sure you have discussed why you would like to take these KVS courses during your course selection meeting



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NEW THIS YEAR- **TUITION BASED ONLINE COURSES (KVS)**



- ❖ Tuition Based Courses (KVS) will be prescheduled during the course selection meeting and requires counselor approval. There is no longer an application for you to submit later.
- ❖ Summer, fall, and spring courses must be prescheduled during course selection.
- ❖ Courses will not be added or changed outside of the course selection timeline in the spring.
- ❖ Additionally, AP Gov, AP Macro will only be approved for 12th graders only. Please reference



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INSTRUCTIONAL DAY REQUEST

- Instructional Day Request (IDR) courses are virtual, asynchronous courses that are designed to provide students with an opportunity to take courses virtually staffed by SLHS staff to provide more flexibility with scheduling.
- Students must be enrolled in 5-credit earning courses on campus not including Tuition Based Courses. Students must abide by the requirements listed on the Application for High School Abbreviated Day form.
- We highly discourage college bound students to have IDR or too many off- periods.



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INSTRUCTIONAL DAY REQUEST

- Students are scheduled into a virtual study hall, late arrival, or early release (off period) during the school day to provide them with a dedicated, daily class period to work on the course.
- Off periods:
 - ❖ 9th Graders are not permitted an off period but may have a study hall
 - ❖ 10th Graders are permitted 1 off period
 - ❖ 11th and 12th are permitted 2 off periods

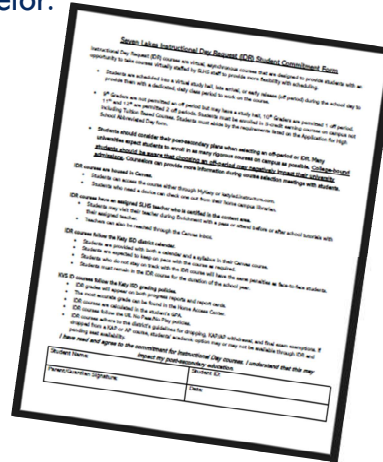
- IDR courses are housed in Canvas.
 - ❖ Students can access the course either through MyKaty or katyisd.instructure.com.
 - ❖ Students who need a device can check one out from their home campus librarian.
- IDR courses have an assigned SLHS teacher who is certified in the content area.
 - ❖ Students may visit their teacher during Enrichment with a pass or attend before or after school tutorials with their assigned teacher.
 - ❖ Teachers can also be reached through the Canvas Inbox.
- IDR courses follow the Katy ISD district calendar.
- IDR courses follow the Katy ISD grading policies.

- You will not be scheduled into an IDR course until the IDR course commitment form is completed and returned to your counselor.
- Students should consider their post-secondary plans when selecting an off-period or IDR. Many universities expect students to enroll in as many rigorous courses on campus as possible.
- College-bound students should be aware that choosing an off-period may negatively impact their university admissions. Counselors can provide more information during course selection meetings with students.

Are you REQUIRED to take certain courses?

COURSES OFTEN REQUIRED

- Precalculus
- Physics
- 4th math, financial math often does not count
- 3+ years of a language other than English
- English 4 or AP Literature



Could an off period hurt your admissions?

Many highly selective universities expect students to take a full load of courses UNLESS there are some extenuating circumstances that require students to have off periods. Examples include health or financial reasons.



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IMPORTANT CONSIDERATIONS FOR COLLEGE BOUND STUDENTS



Are you RECOMMENDED to take certain courses ?

IT'S IMPORTANT TO CHECK THIS FOR YOUR MAJOR, TOO.

Many universities have recommendations that may help your admissions. This can include a 3rd or 4th year of language other than English. Staying in math and social studies for all 4 years of high school, etc. You must research to figure out what these are for your dream schools.



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IMPORTANT CONSIDERATIONS FOR COLLEGE BOUND STUDENTS



Research Scholarship Requirements

SAT AND ACT SCORES

Some universities have require specific GPA or SAT/ACT scores to earn scholarships. It's important to research this ahead of time so you are not scrambling senior year.



Bottom Line

STUDENTS MUST RESEARCH

Because only limited changes can be made to a student's schedule, students **MUST** research course requirements for colleges well in advance. State graduation standards do not always align with college requirements. Don't be blindsided your senior year that you are missing requirements for your dream college!



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CHOOSING COURSES FOR NEXT YEAR

- Choose core (required) courses and enough courses from other areas to complete **seven full class periods**.
- If one course marked (sem) is selected, a second (sem) course is also required.
- Review the online course catalog when making selections.
- List alternate choices in the spaces provided.
- Turn in Course Selection Worksheet to your English teacher by **January 27th**.
- All students will meet with their school counselor to review credits and finalize course requests.
- Remember elective changes for the 2025-2026 school year will not be granted after course verification in late March.

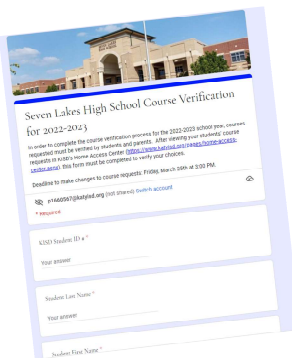

- 2) Make sure you complete both semesters and have 7 total classes each semester.
- 3) Indicate name of the course and course # for each course requested.
- 4) List three full credits of alternate choices in order of preference.
- 5) Complete Course Planner in SchoolLink, **NOT REQUIRED THIS YEAR**.
- 6) Student and parent must sign and return to student's English teacher by **Monday, January 27th**.

Course verification will occur the week of March 1st and **will be the last time to make course changes**.

KATY ISD SCHEDULE CHANGE PROCEDURE - No changes will be made except for the following reasons:

- 1) Student is missing or failed a prerequisite course.
- 2) Change in program (athletics, band, choir, orchestra, etc.)
- 3) Duplicate credit earned
- 4) Change in course level as recommended by teachers & counselors with parental knowledge & principal approval.
- 5) Failure to meet the standard on the STAAR/IDC test.

Effective changes are NOT allowed.

COURSE LEVEL CHANGES: As per the Katy ISD Grading & Reporting Handbook policy, students may only level down to an academic course within established time frames.

- Students may request to level down to the academic level of a course at the start of each semester by the established campus deadline.
- Students may petition to fail a KAP course if they meet the outlined criteria, have a grade of a 75 and below, and a completed Petition to fail form with the teacher and grade-level administrator's approval at the end of the six weeks. Must meet campus deadline to submit form.
